Remembering

Rev. Larry Brickner Wood

Autumn brings with it many celebrations and festivals. The end of October and beginning of November are significant items marking events important in many cultural and religious traditions. Among these are: Halloween, also known as All Hallows Eve, October 31st, which has grown to become a time of "trick or treating" and other festive events.

Samhain, a Celtic tradition marking the end of harvest season and the beginning of winter. The Celts believed that on the eve of Samhain, the veil between heaven and earth was "thin" (a thin place) and spirits could walk among the earth. All Saints Day originated in the Roman Catholic church and is a day to honor all of the saints, known and unknown. It is celebrated on November 1. All Souls Day on November 2nd is a day to celebrate all those who have died. In our Protestant traditions, All Saints Day and All Souls Day are seen as one, as we do not make distinctions between our saints and those "souls" who have passed.

Regardless of name and terminology, this is a time of remembering our beloveds who have died and left this earth. We did this at our service on Sunday, October 27th, when we lit candles to remember those who have died, wrote on small cards the names of some of the people we are remembering, said prayers and sang songs of loss, grief, lament, hope and honoring. For many, this visible way of expressing our grief and mourning of our losses brings healing, hope and comfort. That we do it in community is holy and sacred ground, as we often heal more completely in the shelter of each other. We are God's people celebrating our solidarity as kindreds who have experienced loss in this world.

Our community experienced a dramatic loss recently with the passing of Elizabeth Fogg. We grieve with Andrea, Nate, Kaylee, Seth, Larry and their extended family with the loss of a beloved mother, grandmother and steady shepherd in their lives. Our FCCW community grieves the loss of our beloved Elizabeth, a pillar of the church, a sage, a wisdom keeper whose honesty and straightforward speaking was always done with compassion, wisdom and love. We will all miss her dearly.

Today, Nate Fogg read three powerful scripture passages during our morning service. The Gospel reading was from John, and was the account of the death of Lazarus, Jesus' beloved friend. Though Jesus had been told that Lazarus was ill, the reality of finding that he died moved him deeply, and he wept. Surrounded by family and friends of Lazarus, Jesus' first reaction was to weep, right along with the rest of the community grieving the loss of Lazarus.

Jesus knew the pain of learning a beloved had died. God knows the pain of losing a beloved son. In the companion scriptures to the Gospel of John that Nate read on Sunday, we are reminded that God walks with us through the valleys of death, the heartbreak of loss, the emptiness of grief, and the pain of suffering when a loved one has died. As we walk alongside our beloveds who are grieving their losses, we are God's angels, witnessing to the God with us, and sharing God's love and our own love by our presence, our prayers and our promises to be there. Though we may walk through the valley of death, we are never alone.

Everyone enjoys coffee hour! And thanks to faithful volunteers, we have been able to gather every Sunday. BUT we find ourselves in a situation now where we need to regroup. We NEED more volunteers to step up and make the coffee hour happen (and make the coffee). LC would like to have a team of 6 to 8 persons who will rotate to host the weekly coffee hour. Oh Baby, it's getting cold outside...

Brrrrr. As temperatures fall, heating costs are going up. It's a never-ending cycle, one New Englanders are very familiar with, and love it or not, winter is on its way. It's also a time when folks may find themselves in difficult quandaries—do I go for medical care or heat the house? Can I make only a partial electric payment this month? How can I make this work? There are many households in our community that are enduring financial hardship for any number of reasons. These are stressful situations that take mental and physical tolls on individuals and families. Fortunately, we may be able to provide some temporary emergency financial relief through a Fund set up to help those experiencing hardship; The Feddern Diaconate Discretionary Fund (FDDF).

Thus far in 2024, the FDDF has enabled assistance for propane, fuel oil, cell phone and electric payments as well as mortgage payments, car repairs, medical and grocery assistance. This is all made possible with donations from the beloved members and friends of this church; in memory of loved ones; and even as an alternative to traditional Christmas gift giving. In this spirit, please do consider a donation to support the FDDF fund.



New! Wednesday Chair Yoga



Wrapping another in a shawl knit of your own prayers and loving thoughts is a gift not only for the one receiving the shawl, but for the knitter as well." Janet Bristow and Victoria Cole-Galo-founded the Prayer Shawl Ministry, an all inclusive online charity group, in 1999. Knitters from FCCW have been knitting/ crocheting Prayer Shawls for over 15 years. shawls are shared with those who are in need of comfort in distressful times and can also be given in times of celebration. We are finding now that there is a greater need for shawls than there are shawls in our inventory.

News From Zimbabwe

"People go there to die." That's how FOOT Director Joseph Sibiya describes Chipinge District Hospital. Recently, Austin Muradzikwa, a normally strong and energetic 32-year-old, became one of its patients. Admitted to the men's ward, Austin was in and out of consciousness, unable to speak, eat, or move. He was placed on oxygen as doctors noted he required "injections" to stabilize his health, along with pain relievers and three other prescriptions. Yet, none of these essentials were provided by the hospital. Instead, Austin's uncle, Vrante Mahlupeko, had to source them from local pharmacies.

When doctors recommended an x-ray, Vrante had to transport Austin to a private hospital because Chipinge District's machine wasn't working. That scan cost \$80, and when it proved inconclusive, they recommended another scan in Mutare, 2.5 hours away by ambulance—at a cost of \$160 for transport and \$80 for the second scan. Over seven days, Vrante purchased 14 injections for \$30 a day, totaling \$210 just for the injections.

Through all of this, Vrante felt like he was on a death watch. Each evening, he waited for the dreaded call from the doctor telling him Austin "was no more." One morning, Vrante visited his nephew and found that 10 syringes of medication had mysteriously disappeared. Sadly, this theft is not uncommon. Due to the collapse of Zimbabwe's economy and the 75% reduction in medical staff salaries, hospital workers often steal and resell patients' medication to survive.

As Austin began to respond to treatment, he became aware of the suffering around him. Men lay crying and moaning, unable to afford even basic medication, left to die because they lacked the resources for care. Austin survived thanks to compassionate people in Wakefield who helped cover his costs. After nine days in the hospital, he is now recovering at Vrante's home, deeply emotional and profoundly grateful. He had been certain that, instead of reuniting with his family, he would be sent home in a coffin.

At the time of Austin's discharge, Vrante and his sister Laina encountered a very ill 60-year-old man at the hospital who had just \$1 to contribute toward his medication. With no relatives to assist him, he seemed destined for the same fate as many others in his ward. Vrante and Laina stepped in, paying the \$7 for his treatment that day. What would happen to him after that remained unknown.

Up until 2001, Zimbabwe was a thriving nation with an exceptional education system, a well-functioning agricultural sector—the breadbasket of Africa—and a highly regarded healthcare system. Today, over 90% of the population scrapes by on less than \$100 a month, selling vegetables or taking whatever odd jobs they can find. Pensioners survive on around \$20 a month. When illness strikes, people simply cannot afford treatment.

This is life in Zimbabwe, where many go to the hospital, not to heal, but to die.
