Advent Arrives Again

December 1 marks the first Sunday in Advent, a 24-day journey to Christmas. Advent means "arrival" and the season anticipates the arrival of the Christ child into the world. Though it is a reenactment of the miracle birth in historical terms, it is a dynamic spiritual process that touches us in real time. This Advent season, we invite you to join in a journey of spirit through the Advent themes of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love.

Advent 2024 is quite the season. It comes as much of the world seems in chaos. We have had a tension filled and challenging election season that has heightened anxiety, concern and fear in many. The post-election season will see a transition of power at the national level that excites some and greatly concerns others. It can feel like the promise of unity feels even farther away than it did three weeks ago. Hope and joy are even more critical now.

Around the world so many are under the threat of famine, natural disasters, economic oppression and the worsening effects of climate change. People of all ages and identities are under attack from the wars in Gaza and Lebanon, Ukraine, Somalia and too many more. Political tension is rife on almost every continent and it can feel at times that many are talking and none are listening. Peace and love are needed in every corner of the world.

Into this chaos and calamity comes the Advent season, its journey to Bethlehem and the story of Jesus' birth. We will sing and tell stories, pray and listen, dance and tap feet, and be connected in the shelter of each other. Through the festive time of the season, we will be aware that for some it is a time of remembrances and of losses incurred along the way. Through this season, I encourage you to be attentive to those of tender heart and gentle spirits who are hurting.

I also encourage you to make this Advent season a true spiritual journey, and to take care of yourself and your beloveds. Every Advent into Christmas we celebrate the coming of Jesus into the world. May we also use it as an opportunity to discover or re-discover how Jesus comes into our lives.

This Advent season, take some time each day to read a scripture passage, especially from the Gospels. Take some time for intentional prayer and meditation. Walk or move into nature in ways that work for you. Make a gratitude list and let others know how important they are to you. Use an Advent Calendar and do home weekly Advent candle wreath lighting. Use an Advent devotional or two, alone, with friends and/or family. Find someone or something to forgive this season, including yourself. Live more fully into the Advent dreams of Hope, Peace Joy and Love. Hold the hand of a loved one, or someone for whom loneliness is a constant companion. Practice kindness, shine the Christ light and open your hearts to love. God is always excited to be with you, and always has the time even when we may not.

Blessed Advent and Merry Christmas dear ones. You are people of the Way and people who hold the Christ light so brightly. Hope, Peace, Joy and Love be with you!

News of Zimbabwe

As we enter this season of gratitude and blessings, I am overwhelmed with appreciation for the incredible network of supporters who have been the backbone of our Zimbabwe mission. Twenty-seven years ago we started with a sister church partnership, which grew unexpectedly into a far-reaching effort of transforming lives and communities.

What began as a connection with Rufumiso, UCC Zimbabwe, led to rebuilding a church, building a parsonage, renovating schools, and drilling boreholes. Over the years, our mission has expanded to include sponsorships for children—many from child-headed households—a program that has grown exponentially since it began in 2008-2009. We have coordinated many projects: humanitarian shipping containers, building homes and an ECD classroom, supporting the Daisy Dube Children's Home, implementing food security programs, developing income-generating projects like goat and chicken farming, distributing Hipporollers, creating a reusable sanitary pad program to keep girls in school, providing medical assistance, and now, completing the clinic in Humani.

Child sponsorship remains at the heart of our mission. December is our annual commitment renewal month a time when we invite sponsors to reaffirm their support and welcome new donors into the fold. Whether it is monthly or annual contributions, or one-time donations, every gift ensures school fees, school uniforms and supplies, and brighter futures for these children. Although it can be challenging to stay closely connected with our sponsored children, your love and support over the years have been nothing short of life-changing. This recent photo of women crossing the Save River is a vivid reminder of the strength, resilience and



vulnerability of the people of Zimbabwe. By balancing very heavy parcels on their heads, their hands are unable to carry anything for protection to fend off or scare the crocodiles that are in the water. Their journey does not end at the riverbank; they must still walk 13-16 kilometers (8-10 miles) to reach their homes. This courage and endurance are humbling and surely inspiring for us to continue walking with them.

We have achieved so much over the past 27 years. The journey continues as there is always more to be done. Your involvement matters. Let's continue to walk this path of hope and transformation together with our Zimbabwean brothers and sisters.

Christmas Caroling



Advent Faith Formation



Please join us starting the first Tuesday of Advent, December 3rd. We will be using both an Advent study ("The Carols of Christmas: Daily Advent Devotions" Volume 2) and the Advent devotional from Stillspeaking Writers' Group ("The Mess in the Messiah").

About "Carols of Christmas": This is a heart-warming devotional inspired by some of the most beloved Christmas carols of all time. Inside, you'll enjoy a fresh glimpse of some of the same joyful and nostalgic melodies you sing every year now set to personal reflections in this 28-day devotional journey. The carols include "Silent Night", "Joy to the World", "O Come All Ye Faithful", and



"The First Noel". You'll also discover intriguing stories and thought-provoking details like who wrote the carol; what was going on in their life that perhaps inspired the hymn; and how has God used this hymn throughout time. We will use the time to discuss the "Carols of Christmas" readings for that week, along with listening to a portion of the carol being discussed.

Our class will run for an hour (or so) and will be followed by a sharing of thoughts on the Stillspeaking Advent Devotions. Faith Formation classes meet regularly on Tuesdays at Noon – typically in the Parish Helpers Room. Our gatherings will be hybrid—in-person at church with a Zoom option. There are so many more verses that refer to God's love overcoming our fears. We are to give our doubts and fears to God. We are bombarded daily by news and other media that increases our anxiety. I have found peace in walking the dog, working in the yard (those pesky acorns and leaves) and with the holidays around the corner, engaging in what I call "retail therapy" (shopping). I am going to take a break from the negatives of today and look at the positives that God provides. I will take more walks, read more books, take more naps, and enjoy the season of Advent. They were donated by the Just Peace Players who performed at the November meeting of Parish Helpers and will be shelved in the History Section of the Parish Helpers Library.

November is always a little crazy starting the month with the time change and how dark it gets at the end of the day.

The first week of November we introduced letter Oo, our sensory table was full of pluffle and orange items and our theme was owls . The 3-year-olds painted owls for our school family tree, made an orange collage, fed an "owl" shapes and read Little Owl, Little Owl What Do You See? The 4-year-olds traced lines on an owl and then cut it out for our school family tree, made unifix number towers and did an owl sequencing paper.

During the second week we introduced number 7 and continued our owl theme. Our threes worked on matching a shape to the same owl shape, used mini erasers to trace lines, worked on colors by matching colored owls, did some free painting and explored with playdough. Our fours made shape owls, used magnetic 10-frames to make 7 and used numbered owls to put themselves in sequential order.

The third week of November we worked on letter Tt and our sensory table was filled with corn, feathers, plastic pumpkin manipulatives, Pilgrims and Native American rubber ducks. The threes class did gross motor turkey movements around the room, worked on numbers, then crawled through our tunnel and did our 5 Little Turkeys poem. The fours class did a Thanksgiving cut and paste pattern paper, worked on numbers by doing a 10-frame count the room, rolled a die and built a turkey, did a directive turkey drawing and made The Mayflower out of a paper plate and a straw for the mast.

We celebrated Thanksgiving on the last week of November by sharing a snack with our friends, made a teepee, explored with playdough and feathers, played ring toss onto a paper bag turkey leg, used a turkey baster to blow feathers across a table and used beads to string onto feathers.

We wish everyone a wonderful Thanksgiving with their families and friends! We are so THANKFUL for all of you !!
