Looking for Jesus

The first Sunday in January is Epiphany Sunday, January 5, 2025. The actual day of Epiphany is January 6th, the end of the 12 days of Christmas. Throughout the span of Christian growth and emergence, it has been seen as a great festival at times, and something to be acknowledged but not really celebrated at others. Over time, it has come to commemorate the Baptism of Jesus and the revelation of Jesus to the non-Jewish people through the appearance of the Magi (aka Wise Men) to the Christ child.

The word Epiphany generally means an appearance or manifestation of a divine being; a revelation of essential truth; and an illuminating discovery, realization or disclosure. Both the baptism of Jesus and the appearance of the Magi to the Christ child were epiphanies, not only for those present in those moments but for all of us to come in the generations and centuries that follow.

It was not lost on me that the 2021 attack on our nation's Capital in Washington D.C. occurred on Epiphany, January 6, 2021. I watched in horror that day as Christian flags and symbols and Jesus' name were combined with swastikas, confederate flags, and nationalistic symbols as if they had anything in common. I watched with a broken heart as the capital was stormed, a Vice-President was threatened to be hanged, and a speaker of the House was being hunted like an animal. Police officers lost their lives that day and in the days and weeks that followed. This act of domestic terrorism threatened to break our nation's heart, and we are still in the throes of healing from that terrible event. No revisionist history or casting of the attack as patriotic will change the reality and truth of what occurred that day, the Holy Day of Epiphany where we celebrate the baptism of Jesus as the Christ and the appearance of the Magi, the wisdom keepers, to Jesus.

Jesus was not partisan, a democrat or republican, green party or libertarian, capitalist or socialist. His teaching may be interpreted by some as being political in nature, but I see them rather as fundamental values of how God calls us to live in this world. He said it again and again: Love God with all your heart and love your neighbor as yourselves. Blessed are the poor; blessed are the peacemakers, blessed are the meek and those who thirst for righteousness; blessed are the pure in heart, for they will know God. Let those who are without sin cast the first stone. All who exalt themselves will be humbled and all those who are humble will be exalted.

Throughout his ministry and the ministry of his disciples, Jesus was clear: Love is at the center; compassion and mercy are essential; forgiveness is foundational and loving our neighbor includes loving our enemies. In Jesus' vision, justice, equity and right relationship come in the beloved community that honors and practices these principles, values and commandments.

Jesus never said to take power by violence or conquest. Jesus never said to force others to convert and force them to adhere to your teachings. Jesus never said to seek vengeance and retribution. Jesus never said to imprison your enemies, or govern in ways that leave the multitudes hungry while a few amass great wealth. Despite various strains of Christianity attempting over the centuries to put these words in Jesus' mouth, he did not say them. Nor did he advise to practice in ways that are brutal, oppressive and mean hearted. Jesus' vision was/is completely different, and our witness as disciples is to continue to practice as Christ would have us, no matter how hard and challenging that may be.

In this Epiphany season may our hearts be opened to the new ways being revealed to us every day, to the Glory of God, in honor of the Holy Spirit, and in celebrating the joy that is Jesus.

They either were never winter people, or they just got tired of all the work it takes to maintain a home during this season. While composing this writing I am watching snow descend gracefully in their wintery dance. The birds are flitting from feeder to feeder restoring their body warmth with seeds or suet. At some point today I will shovel and snow blow. But until then I will stoke the fire and relax in my favorite chair with a book and a cup of aromatic hot chocolate giving thanks for this day and this season.

News of Zimbabwe

Deep, deep thanks and appreciation to all who donated to renew child sponsorships or begin a new sponsorship, or give to the girls empowerment sanitary pad initiative or who donated to help feed the children at the Daisy Dube Children's Home.

We currently have 18 children at the primary level, 9 high school students, two in vocational programs and three in college. One student is attending Midlands State University in Zimbabwe completing a masters degree in education. This year we are able to add two additional primaryaged children due to your generosity. You all are amazing. As I have said before, your support changes the trajectory of lives for these children.

But there is more good news! One family donated an astounding amount to put PKZ on the path to drilling a borehole and getting water to the Humani clinic! PKZ Director Vrante Mahlupeko took advantage of a "December promotion" to get the 180' well drilled and the necessary casing for \$4,800. While we still have piping to the clinic itself, a pump with solar panels, the concrete skirting that surrounds the borehole site, a water tank and stand, and ultimately sinks, faucets, and toilets on our wish list, this is an incredible start to achieve our 2025 goals!

Vrante has been assisting Mr. Sindiso Machimbidza, the Daisy Dube Social worker, plan a holiday trip to the Humani Conservation area for a game drive for the 25 young residents. These children rarely leave Mt. Selinda as there is no viable transportation for such a big group. The game drive will give the kids a chance to see giraffes, elephants, zebra, buffalo, impala, kudu, rhinos and more in their native habitat. A traditional braai (BBQ) is part of the event. I hope to receive photos soon but in the meantime enjoy this one of the children having a Christmas feast! Happy New Year!

We had a very busy and exciting December! The first week of the month we introduced number 4. We made ornaments for our December class bulletin board by marble rolling paint with our 3s and using colored pencils dipped in water to color them with our 4s. The sensory table was filled with rice, red and green bells, magnet wands and wooden winter manipulatives. Our three-year-old class did a gingerbread shape cookie song, fed a gingerbread man shapes, walked on sensory "gumdrops" and did a count how many gingerbreads and clip on the correct number activity. Our four-year-old class did a holiday word syllable clap activity, counted how many gingerbreads and cut and glued the correct number in the box, used parquetry blocks to make holiday pictures and played Christmas Bingo.

On the second week we worked on letter Rr. Our morning class used watercolors and painted a snowflake and our afternoon class cut tissue paper and glued it to a snowflake for our class winter bulletin board. We added red and green magnet blocks to our sensory table as well as some small cardboard boxes. The threes used different colored oval shapes to give a reindeer a nose, they rolled a cube and did the reindeer movement they landed on around the room, fed a reindeer a carrot shape and explored with shaving cream. Our afternoon class used holiday erasers to trace zig zag, curvy and wavy lines, did a reindeer color by number paper, used manipulatives to make AB patterns, built number towers with unifix cubes and explored with shaving cream mixed with green foam paint.

For the last week of school in December, we introduced letter Ss. Our threes class read Santa, Santa, What Do You See?, did a Santa and reindeer shape match, worked on colors by finding which colored chimney Santa was hiding behind and explored with playdough. Our fours class did a roll a reindeer dice activity, worked on patterns, did a directed drawing gingerbread house and worked on rhyming cards. Both classes had a visit from Santa and played reindeer games like; antler ring toss, pin the heart on the Grinch, red and green balloon play and paper snowball toss.

We want to wish everyone a very happy holiday and a wonderful 2025!!
