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It continues to be a joy and a privilege to serve as Pastor to our loving, generous, and caring congregation. Thank you for the opportunity to serve over these past six and a half years! As we work together at "hearing God's call and growing in love and care," there is much to celebrate as part of the Body of Christ in Wakefield.

The year has been notable in the life of our church for a number of reasons. We have continued to "deepen and widen" our connections both within the church body and out into the world as we work to further live into the promise of our new organizational structure. This has been a strong area of focus for the pastor along with our Calling and Discernment Team, and the fruits of our efforts are more and more apparent over time. Of particular note is the commitment demonstrated by many of our church leaders to a more deeply interdisciplinary approach to our work together. We have made good strides in our journey with church structure; it continues to be a work in progress—as any strong and appropriately flexible structure should be!

Another point of note has been the creation of a substantial resource for capital expenditures and for expansion/ augmentation of our mission work through the capital campaign. It is meaningful that we accomplished this at the same time we have managed our budget situation very well; involvement in conversation and shaping of our financial life has truly expanded and deepened. We continue to strive to express our mission and vision as fully as possible in all areas of church life, including that of managing our financial resources in service to God and neighbor. Our new structure has been a boon in creating more of a sense of involvement, ownership, and knowledge in our congregation about budgetary matters.

Working on creating and facilitating worship is a profound joy, and walking with our dedicated Deacons in doing so, along with others who participate in a variety of ways in the worship endeavor, has been a primary area of focus. Pastoral care—listening, offering spiritual support and insight, and praying during times of sorrow and joy—is also always a primary focus. We continue to nurture our Visitation Team along, and their participation in visitation is hugely appreciated by those with whom they visit, and by the pastor who is grateful for their assistance.

The Caring Team has quietly been very active over this past year, responding with resource and referral information and interpersonal, prayerful support for folks in our congregation who find themselves in a challenging period. This model of assistance has arisen very organically in our midst, and those of us on the team work very well together. We are currently taking a little break as we reconsider the amount and nature of the involvement that is most appropriate; a brief retreat time is anticipated before we gear up again.

It was a joy last autumn to have a second semester with our seminary intern, Maureen Steer. Perhaps we will be fortunate enough to host another seminary intern at some point. In other educational endeavors, I have greatly enjoyed riding sidecar with George Blomster in the lead at Tuesday noon Bible Study, with that wonderful group of folks who have studied together for so long. This past year, I offered a set of workshops on the public reading of scripture, as well as a book study on Brene Brown's book *The Gifts of Imperfection*.

I have been very active in our wider church this past year in a variety of ways: participating in a monthly Pastoral Consultation Group, leading/ attending clergy Bible study from time to time, attending Conference Annual Meeting as well as some Association gatherings, presenting at Prepared to Serve with folks from our church and with my husband and two other clergy couples, wrapping up serving as advisor to former seminary student Emily Goodnow, and participating in the installation of the new pastor at the Rochester UCC Church. After many years of serving on the Clergy Convocation Planning Committee, I decided to step down for a change of pace, in light of some of the health challenges with which I was faced. I am delighted to say that I am generally feeling much better now!

In the local community, I have continued to convene and facilitate the conversation of the Ready to Learn group, a group of representatives from various human service agencies, community organizations, as well as a number of community helpers, clergy, and school personnel related to Wakefield. We discuss and seek solutions to challenges for Wakefield families and children who are experiencing social and economic challenges. I have also continued helping to organize the ecumenical clergy luncheons and other shared endeavors; it was a great step that this past program year we offered both an ecumenical Thanksgiving Sunday afternoon service, and an ecumenical Good Friday service. I am pleased also to continue to be an *ex officio* member of the Food Pantry Board.

The Diaconate and I are deep in the throes of sabbatical planning and we anticipate a fruitful and galvanizing experience for our congregation, our sabbatical minister, and this pastor, who is profoundly grateful for the wonderful privilege of a sabbatical. I thank you from the bottom of my heart, and look forward to continuing our journey together as we seek to "hear God's call and grow in love and care" in everything we do as Christ's church.

I would also like to thank those who have trusted us to make the right decisions and keep things running smoothly. I would finally like to thank God for all of you, and all that we can be so very thankful for.

AN OPEN AND AFFIRMING CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES SUNDAY, JUNE 10, 2012

The Annual Meeting of The First Congregational church of Wakefield was held on Sunday June 10, 2012 a in the Fellowship Hall following worship service and a brunch.

Moderator George Ackerman opened the meeting at 11:50.am.

Reverend Mary James led us in an opening prayer.

We had a Moment of Remembrance for those members of our church family that have passed away this year: Arlene Berg and H.William Maleham.

The minutes of the 2011 Annual Meeting were reviewed. A correction to state that Connie Littlefield NOT Janice Brejwo presented the 2011/2012 financial report and budget. Minutes were approved as corrected.

SPECIAL GUEST PRESENTATION: TIM SCOTT.

Tim Scott of COUNTRY COUNSELLING GROUP(corrected to state Country Consulting group) conducted a Capital Campaign Feasibility Study for our church. Mr. Scott presented the feasibility study and a summary for the congregational meeting. The reports are included with these minutes.

There were various comments from members:

We/You are the church-there is no they.

What needs to be done? Present the list and costs.

What are the mechanics of the Capital Campaign?

Care of the church is a ministry.

You have to do more than pray.

Consider having a mission committee to ask for money once a year, not every Sunday.

We would like to bring more families in the church.

You can do this, if you come to believe you can!

George Ackerman resumed the moderator role and suggested a meeting date to discuss the Capital Campaign. July 15, 2012 is the suggested date. Z-Team will be gone but proxy votes will be taken. The agenda of the meeting will be to decide if the congregation should move forward with the Capital Campaign.

RECEIVING OF THE REPORTS

Jan Fairchild explained the Personnel Ministry Performance Appraisal of the Pastor. This year will (remove) we will do a performance appraisal of ourselves as a congregation. The report is part of the Annual Report of 2012.

Janice Brejwo reported that the Treasurers Annual report will be available after June 30, 2012. Janice thanked the congregation for all they do with volunteer work and the monetary gifts.

All reports from ministries were received.

NEW BUSINESS

BUDGET 2012-2013

The budget was presented by Janice Brejwo and Harriet Wilson, members of the Budget Ministry.

LINE 5-Janice explained that LINE 5 is based on 95% of the Intentional Giving. Circumstances change during the year which prevents people from fulfilling their pledge. It could be due to moving from the community, death or a change of financial circumstances.

LINE 7 -The additional \$2000.00 pledge from the Parish Helpers has not been approved by the full membership of the Parish Helpers.

LINE 9- Fundraising is based on a projected amount of money from yard sales; the Christmas Fair; dinners; a new approach using Craig's List to sell items; Soles for Shoes; a craft fair Sept. 29, 2012.

MOTION TO ACCEPT THE BUDGET AS PRESENTED WAS MADE BY TITIA BOZUWA. 2^{ND} BY BILL GOODWIN.

MOTION PASSED.

Recognition was given by Rev. Mary to the congregation for their Spiritual Gifts. Thank you to those who claimed a ministry this year. Thank you for those who claimed the same ministry for the coming year.

George Ackerman reminded us to Thank God for our gifts and to let them shine.

Rev. Mary led us in a Benediction with a circle of prayer which included all present at the meeting.

Treasurer

This completes my third year as church treasurer. I am honored that you allow me the opportunity to serve our church in this position. Happily, I am able to report that as of May 31, 2013 income received surpassed expenditures in the general operating budget. I anticipate we will once again end the year with a positive cash flow. The Treasurer's annual report covering the fiscal year July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013 will be issued at the end of July. The report will be distributed by email and will also be available at the church.

The annual report as well as all those monthly reports I distribute are full of income and expense numbers. Some of these numbers represent the congregation's generosity in the form of pledges, Parish Helpers contributions, Sunday morning collections, and fund raising. But, there is generosity you cannot see in the numbers. Many unreported donations throughout the year are expenses the church does not have to pay. These are <u>not</u> recorded against our budget and, therefore, are <u>not</u> reflected in my treasurer reports. These donations are gifts from Circle 227 donors and others who pay church related out-of-pocket expenses without seeking reimbursement.

Volunteers exude generosity in fulfilling the church's mission by providing valuable services as well as being careful stewards of our resources. Without our volunteers we could not balance a budget and there would be no unexpended funds at the end of the year. Of course, I am writing about our faithful cleaners, church school teachers, ministry coordinators, cookie bakers, worker bees at Harvest Fair, the Annual Yard Sale, Pride Day, church dinners.... The list goes on.

Generosity abounds in our church in more ways than just supporting our operating budget. Mission work as part of who we are is ongoing throughout the year. Besides the \$7000 in our operating budget to support the UCC's Our Church's Wider Mission, this year the church family also contributed nearly \$3000 in support of One Great Hour of Sharing, Neighbors in Need, the Christmas Fund, Heifer, Blankets Plus and the Wakefield Food Pantry. In addition, the Feddern Diaconate Discretionary Fund provided substantial monetary assistance to many needy local families and individuals. Finally, the Church school children and others filled Liberty's jar with coins providing him with an education and hope. This was, of course, only a small part of the church continued support to the Z Team.

As you can see, being your treasurer is not just about dollars and cents; it is being part of the church's vision of care and love. Thank you everyone for your support and your generous giving nature.

Buildings & Grounds

The base plate in the bottom of the elevator shaft has been scraped (rust) and painted with a protective paint (por 15). We still have a water issue under the elevator, this will be checked into during the summer and have a cement water sealer applied.

Work has been done on the outside of the church , painting and repairing rotted boards. More needs to be done. I will need to get estimates for future work.

We now have a clear schedule written up for all of the maintenance that is done during the year. Elevator - Sprinkler system/fire protection - Alarm system - boiler ,state inspection etc.

Mold remediation done last year.

Waiting for approval for the septic system and easement on the property owned by Nancy Spencer-Smith. The design for the system is complete and has been given to her to review. Once that is done, I will send it to the state for approval and to contractors for bids on the cost of installing. Will put it out to local contractors.

The boiler room, electric panel room, elevator panel room have all been cleared out. These cannot be used for storage.

Inspectors need clear access to all these areas.

One item that still needs to be looked at is the dishwasher. Due to lack of use some of the rubber gaskets have dried out.

There is always an on going concern about keeping the building clean, we do have mice & ants so it's important to keep all areas clear of spilled foods and liquids (juice etc)

Calling & Discernment

Calling & Discernment organized and facilitated the second annual Ministry Fair during the worship service on July 22, 2012. Attendees were invited to write down the Ministries, which they felt called to serve for the coming year. Results were compiled and distributed to the officers and ministry coordinators.

Throughout the year we monitored concerns and questions about the process of calling out people to share their spiritual gifts. Information about the new organizational structure was provided in a number of formats via church bulletins and website, Steeple View articles, meetings and conversations.

On February 23, 2013, we participated in a presentation "Progress Report: Second Year of Unleashing Spiritual Gifts with New Structure" at Prepared to Serve, New Hampshire Conference, United Church of Christ. The presentation by Margie Galabrun, Mary James and Jan Fairchild was well received and several people requested additional materials. Others requested that we return next year for another update.

On April 13, 2013, Donna & George Ackerman hosted a potluck lunch at their home. In addition to fine food and fellowship, Calling & Discernment led a discussion of the status of our ministry organization. We shared our progress and challenges in sharing our spiritual gifts to fulfill our Mission and Vision statements.

We conducted two email surveys during the year to gather information from the officers and coordinators. As a result of this feedback we continue to strive for improved communication and education about our process. We continue to improve our mutual calling out the gifts of others as we share our own gifts. Officers and Coordinators continue to grow in their empowerment to coordinate those who indicate interest and gifts for specific ministries. There continues to be a need for improved communication and knowledge about "who does what."

In May potential new church members received spiritual gift surveys and encouragement to complete them and share their results with Calling & Discernment.

On May 21, Calling & Discernment introduced to Leadership Council motions to change voting representation at Leadership Council; reporting and minutes guidelines; and changes in Ministry organization from three teams to one Team Synergy.

More details will be forthcoming in Council minutes and new by-laws and policies & procedures.

Plans for the third annual Ministry Fair are underway. The Ministry Fair will be during worship on Sunday, June 23. The Officers and Coordinators will present their ministry descriptions and seek people's commitment to serve specific area(s) for the coming year. Calling & Discernment will assist with the details of the event and collate and communicate results.

Church School

This was a difficult and complicated year for the Church School.

Josie Perkins, Church School Director, working with Pastor Mary James, Margie Galabrun, Christian Education Coordinator, and a group of teachers and parents initiated a plan for the 2012-2013 church school year. A major change was moving Sunday School to one hour before the worship service, 9:00 am. The curriculum was Whole People of God.

Josie resigned from the Church School Director position on August 28. 2012. The formerly paid position was replaced by volunteers. Jan Fairchild, Ginny Schweitzer and Raenya Morann agreed to act as the Collaborative Church School Team to organize, schedule and assure the existence of Sunday School classes.

Sunday School Kickoff Sunday was held on September 9 and four children attended with their parents. The early schedule of Sunday School (9-9:45 am) was followed during the month of September. A parent teacher meeting on

September 23 produced good feedback and the strong recommendation that the Sunday School hour be changed back to during the worship hour (following the Children's Message).

Our church community has a small population of children ranging in age from 2-14 years. Although early planning allowed for three classes for different age levels, this was modified to one class for all ages. The class was taught by one teacher who prepared the lesson and one assistant who provided support. Fulfilling Safe School standards, scheduling assured the presence of two adults with the children throughout all of the classes. Attendance was generally sporadic, ranging from 0-5 or 6 of "regulars". There were occasional baptism Sundays when the attendance jumped to 8-11 with guests attending church one time. Overall Sunday School attendance averaged 4 students per Sunday. (4 students is a mean, disproportionately inflated by those occasional special Sundays, i.e., baptisms). The volunteer church school staff included 8 teachers and 7 assistants. We appreciated the faithful participation and teaching of all the volunteers throughout the year.

Our experience with the curriculum was positive and it has been purchased for the coming year. We have scheduled a meeting for planning next year's Sunday School program which will involve the Christian Education Coordinator, the Pastor and the Collaborative Church School Team. There will also be an end of the year Parent meeting to obtain their evaluation and recommendations for the Church School Program.

This report actually covers two years, July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012, and July 1, 2012 through May 31, 2013, as the Diaconate did not submit an annual report last year. (Oops!)

Our great thanks for their service to Dick Nelson, Cathy Koukal, and Chris Feddern who left the Diaconate over this two year period. We miss you!

The Diaconate continues to meet monthly, usually with Pastor Mary, to discuss regular Sunday worship and special services, review concerns of our members, friends, and community, and provide assistance as we are able. We participate in new member meetings. We have assisted at funerals and weddings and assist Rev Mary with visitations – many of us are members of the visitation team. We have arranged pulpit supply in Mary's absence; our thanks to Rev Janice Fairchild, Maureen Steer, Titia Bozuwa, and Donna Akerman who have filled in. In February 2012, we celebrated 5 years under Rev Mary's spiritual leadership with a special service of thanksgiving. We also coordinated a send-off service for members of our Z-Team on July 1, 2012.

We were thrilled to have Maureen Steer, student intern, working with Pastor Mary for two terms as part of her training at Bangor Theological Seminary. Maureen led and participated in worship services, visited parishioners, and led study groups as part of her internship. She came as a student and left as our dear friend. We are confident of her success as a minister and pastor when her seminary time is complete.

The Diaconate administers the Feddern Diaconate Discretionary Fund with Pastor Mary; the current balance in that fund is \$437.52. We were able to provide \$1835.59 in assistance during 2011-2012, and \$2831.93 through April 30 of 2013. These payments covered such things as rent, fuel oil & electricity, medical needs, & gas cards. We consider requests for assistance from Wakefield and Brookfield, and from our parishioners in other communities. Thanks to all those who continue to contribute to the fund and make this help possible.

One of our major efforts over the past 12 to 18 months has been in securing pastoral coverage during Pastor Mary's well deserved and earned sabbatical from August 1 through October 31, 2013. We are very excited to have Rev Albert Mhururu coming from the UCC in Zimbabwe to serve as our sabbatical minister. Our Z-Team has met him several times and feels he will be a good fit for our congregation; Connie Littlefield has been instrumental in making the travel arrangements. Thank you, Connie! Rev Mhururu will lead us in worship, administer the sacraments, make pastoral visits, and be available for other pastoral needs. We are grateful to Chris and Titia Bozuwa, George and Donna Ackerman, and Rob Nelson, who will provide housing for Rev Mhururu during his stay. Please feel free to invite Rev Mhururu to your homes or to any outings you may have planned while he is here. He will be learning about us, our way of life, and our church ministries, just as we will be learning about his. This will be wonderful adventure! Please see Steeple Views for other information about Rev Mhururu, and check out the Power-Point presentation on the church website.

At the suggestion of Elizabeth Fogg, the Diaconate is now providing visitor bags to first time visitors to our worship services. The bags contain an overview of church activities, a pew brochure, a prayer square, a spiritual gift bookmark, and information on community & county services. Bags for children include a prayer square, stickers, and a Bible bookmark. Our great thanks to Rev Jan Fairchild who keeps up our supply!

This year, at the suggestion of Carol Lundgren, we instituted friendship pads in each of the pews. The pads provide a space for each of us to put our name, our relationship to the church, and our e-mail address. There is also a place to note if you would like a call from the pastor. The idea is to pass this pad along the pew for everyone to sign, and then pass it back again. In this way, we come to know each other better, and extend the hand of friendship to visitors. Rev Mary has found these pads to be very helpful in identifying visitors. So yes, even if you're a member and you're here almost every week, please keep that friendship pad moving on Sunday mornings!

It has been our practice for many years to set aside a time in each worship service for prayer concerns and celebrations raised by the congregation. We are happy to share in these joys and concerns, and many of us make them part of our individual prayer time during the week. It would be most helpful if those who wish to raise a concern or a celebration could write it down and give it to one of the deacons on duty prior to the service; we will make sure the information gets to Rev Mary to be included in the prayer time. Paper is provided at the back of the sanctuary. Thank you!

Our great appreciation to Rev Mary for her continued spiritual guidance to all our members and friends through worship, prayer, and growth. Blessings to this congregation!

Historian & Archivist

The work of our Ministry is behind the scenes and not visible to most church members, unless you look into the back classroom. The church records and papers have been collected and sorted and placed into boxes by category. The next step will be to sort the material again and discard duplicates and non-essential material.

We have created a data base documenting the items in our collection.

We have created a data base of specific site locations of on-site materials.

We are working on a database of locations in New Hampshire that have records pertaining to our church.

The next goal will be to order metal, fireproof storage units. This is an expensive item. But it is also, a one time purchase. I strongly urge the congregation to support this important addition to our church building. We currently have decades of records missing because of a fire at the home of Captain Yeaton. The records were from the years 1800 to 1820. As Stewards of the Church for future generations it is imperative that we preserve our paper records, photos, videos and any other historical item.

A consultant reviewed our archives and the space available within the church to advise us where to place the storage units and how much storage we need based on the linear foot of the current material. The mold issue and humidity within the building is a concern, so is the sprinkler system. We are hoping for this next step to begin this summer.

Historian

Carol Lundgren and I interviewed Ann Hatch. The main topic of questions was related to her experience and memories within our church. Carol videotaped the interview. This was the second video recorded by Carol with Ann Hatch. These interviews will be part of the Archives.

Ann shared a packet of children's programs from 1941 to 1953. There are plays for the children to perform on Christmas and Children's Sunday in June. I wonder if our present Church School students would like to 'recycle' this material and present it to the congregation.

We are happy to take any past material and photos pertaining to the life of our church. Think of this Ministry when you are making room for new items in your home. We will gladly review, copy and return, or store the materials.

Thank you for your support and help as we attempt to preserve the history of our cherished church.

Notes

The \$54,423.19 Capital Campaign Fund reflects all cash received as of 5-31-13 (not counting in-kind donations of \$4360.00) less the \$20,160.81 that has already been spent on capital needs. The total amount that has been pledged to the Campaign so far is \$159,350.

Because the Capital Campaign Fund includes money that will be used for current needs, the 5-23-12 and 5-31-13 amounts should not be considered as investments. Subtracting them from the year-end totals results in \$264,115.16 for 2012 and \$269,239.20 for 2013, a year-to-year increase of \$5124.04, or 1.94% in the value of the church's investments. This is a modest increase, but it must be understood in light of the fact that dividends from Paul Fund B and the Parsonage Fund are not reinvested, but rather go to support Innovative Programs and the Senior Pastor's housing respectively.

The Virginia C. Wentworth Fund was moved to the United Church Fund's fixed income investment on 1-1-13, when the Certificate of Deposit in which it had been held matured. This change was made when it was determined that the stained glass windows---for which the Wentworth bequest had been made---would not need repair for the forseeable future. With dividends from the fixed income fund re-invested, the Leadership Council deemed it likely that this fund would grow more rapidly than if the money continued to be deposited in CD's.

The \$5042.12 increase in Paul Fund B amount reflects the repayment of the \$5000 taken out for the Capital Campaign consultant's retainer, plus a modest gain in the value of the underlying fixed income fund investment. The repayment came from cash received by the Capital Campaign.

The \$1157.86 decrease in Paul Fund C reflects money deducted to support Innovative Programs during the course of the year. Fund C is replenished by the quarterly dividends paid by Fund B.

The Parsonage Fund increased by \$1094.17 due to the modest gain of the underlying fixed income investment. All dividends from this fund are paid out to the church in support of the Senior Pastor's housing.

The \$110.25 increase in the Alden Young Grant reflects the accrued interest from the 1 year Ally Bank CD in which the grant funds were placed on 11-13-12. These funds are earmarked for upgrading the church's septic system, and can be withdrawn for that purpose at any time without penalty.

The balance in the Memorial Gifts account (not shown above) is \$8560.27, including interest.

Forward in Faith Renewing a Spirit of Purpose and Place Capital Campaign – Phase I

This Capital Campaign grew out of critical issues (well beyond the reach of our modest annual budget) and a deep desire to be good stewards of the church and renew a spirit of purpose and place. We set a goal of raising \$300,000.

There are three focal points of this campaign, as approved by a vote of the congregation on July 22, 2012:

Inreach – providing for the immediate care of our beautiful church and its grounds.

Outreach – expressing God's love in the community and the world through current missions.

Endowment and Legacy – establishing a maintenance reserve for future building repairs, and an endowment that will augment and expand mission.

Our beloved church has some aging "issues". A list has been made for some big ticket repairs. Some are already completed and some are planned. Items such as: driveway drainage (done), Fellowship Hall mold remediation (done), painting and scraping church exterior (mostly done), septic system (coming soon), energy conservation (being evaluated), and more.

Then, there is our "spirit of purpose" – as a community church, we are actively engaged, bringing positive programs to the forefront of discussions with other pastoral leaders, local educators and interested citizens – regardless of church affiliation. We demonstrate spirit of purpose in programs like "Awakening the Dreamer" (thank you Margie), conversations around "Ready to Learn" (thank you Rev. Mary), supporting the Wakefield Food Pantry (many of our church members are active in the WFP) and the Good Shepard transportation program (thank you Rachel and Margie and wonderful volunteers). Our annual hosting of Vacation Bible School brings many children and families here for a week of innovative play, learning to love one another better through Christ's message (thank you Miss Penny, Miss Jan, Miss Ginny).

The third point of focus is providing financial stewardship for the future. We know that there will be additional expenses going forward, some of which we can anticipate and some which are unforeseen. It is, therefore, prudent to put money away for the future, just as it is for any household. In addition, creating an endowment that generates income will allow us to further grow our missions.

Phase I of the Capital Campaign is completed and we are blessed to have pledges totaling \$159,350, of which \$20,160.81 has been spent on immediate needs and \$54,423.19 is in our bank account.

Phase II is next. In the coming months, a small group of intrepid folks will be asking local community members, philanthropic foundations, and out-of-town former FCCW members to be a part of this historic effort. We anticipate wrapping up Phase II early this Fall.

It has taken us longer than originally anticipated to complete the campaign, and we are pleased about the outcomes so far. We will continue to inform the congregation about our progress. We certainly can use assistance bringing the campaign to its conclusion. Let us know if you would like to help with the final phase.

Meanwhile, the Leadership Council has selected and charged a group of members with the responsibility to shape the way in which the Capital Campaign funds will be designated for use.

We look forward to keeping you updated.

Personnel

Personnel participated in duties as described by the Personnel Policy Manual.

During July & August, 2012, Personnel representatives worked with Josie Perkins, Church School Director. Josie resigned her position effective August 30, 2012. Personnel worked with Christian Education ministry to develop plans for the organization and staffing of the Church School.

A number of options were explored, including hiring child care providers. It was decided to use a voluntary Collaborative Church School Team. (Refer to Church School Annual Report for additional details.)

Jan Fairchild continued to be the contact person who monitored work flow and management issues related to the Administrative Assistant position. Given this relationship she was also asked to sign payment vouchers related to a variety of church expenses. Susie Goodwin continued to be the liaison with the Music Director/Organist and Dave Schweitzer continued to be the contact person with the Pastor and Deacons .

Staff budget expenses for the new fiscal year for the Administrative Assistant were proposed to the Budget Team in January, 2013. Jan justified the recommendations for an increase in work hours:

20 hours per week, July – December, 2012; 15 hours per week, January-June, 2013. The justification was based, in part, on the increased duties that the Administrative Assistant will assume during Pastor Mary's Sabbatical.

Personnel participated in some discussions regarding the expectations and responsibilities of the Sabbatical replacement Pastor. The Deacons are assuming the primary responsibility for the Sabbatical planning. Personnel will anticipate communication from the Deacons regarding any necessary (temporary) change in Personnel responsibilities.

The annual Performance Appraisal for the Administrative Assistant will be completed in June.

It is anticipated that Personnel will have critical input to the proposals of new By-laws and Policies for the church in the coming year.

"Here I am Lord! Is it I Lord? I have heard you calling in the night. I will go Lord, if You lead me. I will hold your people in my heart."

Dear Reader of this Report – you may ask what these "Six Biblical Financial Principals" and the quote from a favorite hymn mean to YOU. It's a right question. Every person is a Steward of God's gifts – in one's personal life and in the life of First Congregational Church of Wakefield. Gifts of time, talent and treasure enrich our congregation in its work within and beyond Wakefield Village and likewise, our personal lives.

The centerpiece of Stewardship is the Whole Hearted Giving 2013-14 pledge campaign. Pledges from members and friends are the **foundation** upon which the Church is able to plan (or revise plans) for the year ahead. One example: the amazing "Clean Team Ministry" folks who keep the sanctuary ready for worship, kitchens, Parish Helpers Room, three bathrooms, Fellowship Hall and hallways neat, tidy and ready for service. This one ministry greatly reduces expenses, leaving more money available for our core Ministries.

In addition, the frugalness of the ministries last year, the careful stewardship of lights and heat, the continued cleaning of the church done by members and other economies has led to an unspent balance in the checkbook of our beloved church. Leadership Council, in its wisdom and vision, recommends a portion of this money be applied to the budget shortfall. This is the budget that is being presented to you, voting members, at Annual Meeting for final approval. Thanks be to God for leading us to the ability to present a balanced budget for 2013-14.

During the summer of 2012 we were fortunate to have a number of guests musicians offer their musical gifts during summer services. Both choirs traditionally take the summer months off from their weekly rehearsals. Our thanks go to Carol Riley, Andrea Szirbik, Pat Vittum and the 3 Mezzos, Rob Nelson, Susie Goodwin and Rev. Mary.

Both the Memorial Bell Choir and the vocal choir participated in the Christmas season services. Jo Szirbik and children presented a lovely interpretive dance routine into worship. The Sunday School children participated in our annual Pageant. Jan Stanley represented the Music and Theatrical Ministry Team at the Prepared to Serve conference. Some great ideas were shared and incorporated during the Easter season. We included dramatic presentations on Palm Sunday and Easter morning using actors from our congregation. Feedback from participants and congregation was positive. It helped us understand how common people felt as they witnessed the last days of Christ's time on earth. We hope to present more dramatic moments into future services.

Budgetary limitations were a challenge for music directors as we tried to build upon and update our current music libraries and supplies. Replacement bell parts were purchased by the director.

The Team strongly felt we need to bring our Voice Choir Director/Organist's salary up to current standards. We proposed a \$1000 increase again this year. This increase still does not bring us up to the average salary for a church organist. Cindy spends many hours each week preparing for rehearsals and recording accompaniments as well as time spent in church.

We are into the 25th anniversary year of the Bell Choir and the first song we played in church 25 years ago was included in a recent service. We are hoping to celebrate our anniversary with a summer or fall concert. We deeply appreciate the dedication, loyalty and hard work of the individuals who sing in the choir and those who ring bells. Rehearsal time is a huge commitment. These folks give a number of hours each week to ensure a high quality of music during our worship services. They are all a part of our music mission – helping to bring the love of God to our church.

It seems hard to believe that we have been partnered with Rufumiso, our sister church in Zimbabwe, for a little more than 16 years!

This past year has been a busy one, with the mission trip in July 2012 as a highlight. Ann Bilodeau, Maggie Mason, a senior at Spaulding High School, and I shared a three week adventure as we participated in three work camps involving painting classrooms at Dzika and Goko Primary School, making a cement floor for South Down Church, and renovating a teacher's house at Goko. We spent wonderful time meeting new friends at Chikanga Church in Mutare, led workshop at Waterfalls UCCZ, and met our FOOT family in the communities of Harare, Chipinge, Chikore, and Dzika. We visited Mt. Selinda High School, Chinaa Primary and Chinaa High School, Chikore High School, Rimbi High School, Big Tree Primary School and of course, the schools at Dzika and at Goko. (Goko is one of nine schools in the Rufumiso community.) We celebrated the opening of the Peg Harvey block of classrooms, got involved in the exciting and joyful completion of fundraising celebrations to bring electricity to Dzika, and were swept away by special presentations from our goat beneficiaries. Our goat project began a few years ago with 25 beneficiaries. The number of recipients had grown to 85 in their style of paying it forward to another person in need. We took part in a fabulous ordination ceremony for Rev. Greator Fakarai, a first for the UCCZ to have partner church delegates participating. We visited Chikore Mission Clinic, Daisy Dube Orphanage, Tamandi clinic, Ratelshoek Clinic and Muskewa Clinic, leaving donated medical supplies along the way. We lived with Zimbabwean families; they took us into their hearts as we took them into ours. Dear friends Joseph Sibiya and Rev. Mutsumbei escorted us and we spent valuable time with their families, with our FOOT children, and with our dearly loved friends at Rufumiso.

Additionally,

- Ann and I have made presentations at the NH Conference Ukama Fair, and at Union, Deering and Dover churches, in addition to a slide show and Zim meal at FCCW.
- We are currently sponsoring 26 children, down from last year's number of 31. We were delighted to receive letters from most of them and plans are in the works to have them send video greetings that can be shared at church.
- Fundraising activities have included three pancake breakfasts (Oct, Feb and June) and assisting chef extraordinaire Barry Lockard in a delicious Italian Dinner in January. A "decathlon" was held at Spaulding High School, facilitated by the Z Team and Spaulding's Interact Club, yielding \$2100 toward the continued rebuilding of Dzika Primary.
- We are busy sorting items for our 7th shipping container which will be loaded in Rochester on Saturday, Sept 14, 2013. Last year we had more than 25 church groups joining our project which enabled us to make sure every church within the UCCZ received clothing, school or medical supplies, or other humanitarian assistance. Your wonderful donations, along with the physical help on packing day, make this all possible!
- We have provided a lot of support in the form of clothing, school supplies, dorm items, hot meals and more for Rev. Mutsumbei who has been studying at Andover Newton Theological School. More importantly, so many people have extended the hand of friendship while he is separated from his family and a familiar way of life. He has greatly appreciated the warmth, hospitality, and generosity of the Wakefield Church members. He has enjoyed meeting with our youth and all of the warm greetings during Sunday worship.
- I have worked with Diaconate to facilitate Rev. Mhururu's visa application and travel to the US. We look forward to a time of new learning and growth as he covers Mary's sabbatical.
- The Z Team continues to coordinate the annual Yard Sale to benefit the Wakefield Church as a way of giving back for all of the funds that are raised that go overseas.

Thank you and bless you for your continued love and support that makes all of this outreach possible. You are the foundation in making extraordinary things happen for children in Zimbabwe!
